

BETTER OFF FUNDING

OVERVIEW

THE BETTER OFF PACKAGE IS ONE OF THE FINANCIAL SUPPORT PACKAGES PROVIDED TO LOCAL AUTHORITIES UNDER THE THREE WATERS INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAMME ENABLING COUNCILS TO INVEST IN THEIR LOCAL COMMUNITIES. \$500 MILLION OF CROWN FUNDING HAS BEEN PRE-ALLOCATED TO COUNCILS BASED ON A NATIONALLY CONSISTENT FORMULA.

The funding was available from 1 July 2022. Government has appointed Crown Infrastructure Partners (CIP) to administer and monitor the fund for the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA). The programme will enable councils to focus on the wellbeing and aspirations of their communities. This Better Off Funding can be used for those projects communities feel they need the most, be it local parks and gardens, swimming pools, libraries and community centres, or investment in public transport and infrastructure to protect against extreme weather events and sea level rises.

The Programme must support one or more of the Better Off Package criteria:

- Delivery of infrastructure and/or services that enable housing development and growth, with a focus on brownfield and infill development opportunities where those are available.
- Supporting communities to transition to a sustainable and low-emissions economy, including by building resilience
 to climate change and natural hazards.
- · Delivery of infrastructure and/or services that support local place-making and improvements in community well-being.

Funding proposals must be for new initiatives or projects; or accelerate, scale-up and or enhance the quality of planned investment.

The duration of the Programme of Expenditure must be 5 years or less with a completion date on or before 30 June 2027. The Total Maximum Amount Payable must be equal to or less than the Local Authority's Crown Funding allocation.



BETTER OFF FUNDING CASE STUDIES

ELECTRIC BUS DEPOT, LYALL BAY, WELLINGTON, GREATER WELLINGTON REGIONAL COUNCIL (GWRC)

GREATER WELLINGTON REGIONAL COUNCIL (GRWC) HAS SECURED A LONG-TERM SUB-LEASE OF A BLOCK OF LAND IN LYALL BAY ON TIRANGI ROAD AND KINGSFORD SMITH STREET.

\$1.1 million of DIA Better Off Funds have been used to develop the detailed design and implementation plan, and initial feasibility study and assessment for an electric bus depot at this site to deliver on GWRC's commitment to having a largely electric bus fleet by 2030. The site will be developed in stages, as the electric fleet grows. Initially, a parking and charging layover for 68 electric buses is proposed with construction of the first stage of the development commencing by the end of 2024 and commissioned by the end of 2025. Improved environmental outcomes include an on-site stormwater system to clean the stormwater before it enters the Cook Strait.

PINEHAVEN STREAM IMPROVEMENTS PHASE 2, UPPER HUTT CITY COUNCIL

ON BEHALF OF GREATER WELLINGTON AND UPPER HUTT CITY COUNCIL, WELLINGTON WATER IS UNDERTAKING A PHASED PROGRAMME OF WORKS TO UPGRADE AND INCREASE THE CAPACITY OF THE PINEHAVEN STREAM TO REDUCE FLOOD RISK TO THE SURROUNDING AREA.

By making the stream wider and deeper, the capacity in the stream is being increased five-fold for a 1 in 25-year return period flood event. There will be significant improvements in flood protection for over 50 vulnerable properties and improvements for 179 properties affected by secondary stormwater flow paths.

\$2.4 million BOF funds contributed to the \$5 million Phase 2 stream improvements, completed in March 2024 which included:

- Widening a section of the stream.
- Building new retaining walls immediately downstream of the Sunbrae culvert.
- Widening the stream banks further downstream, where there is more space available.
- Removing the existing pedestrian bridge over Pinehaven Stream at Willow Park and replacing it with a new pedestrian and cycle bridge.
- Improving the pedestrian path through Willow Park.
- New and replacement planting of native trees and plants.
- Upgrading the junction where Pinehaven Stream joins Hulls Creek (by the Silverstream Railway Station) to make it easier for fish and eels to travel between the two watercourses.

RURAL DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS, WAIROA DISTRICT COUNCIL

WAIROA DISTRICT COUNCIL UNDERTOOK TO IMPROVE THE DRAINAGE IN RURAL AREAS OF THE DISTRICT BY UPGRADING THREE SITES WITH NEW CULVERTS, DRAINS AND ASSOCIATED STORMWATER PIPES ALONG THE RURAL ROADS.

The project was introduced by the Council to assist with the rural drainage improvements, particularly following Cyclone Gabrielle.

Construction works started in late February 2024 and the project was completed on-time and on-budget via the \$275k of BOF funds in June 2024. It has significantly reduced the

flooding issues for the sites, and they no longer experienced flooding with the recent rain events that occurred in the region.

The project greatly improved the community wellbeing due to having services that function well.

The works completed involved:

- · New stormwater pipes.
- New culverts.
- Other drainage improvement works.
- · Re-instatement of roads and berms.
