

BETTER OFF FUNDING

OVERVIEW

THE BETTER OFF PACKAGE IS ONE OF THE FINANCIAL SUPPORT PACKAGES PROVIDED TO LOCAL AUTHORITIES UNDER THE THREE WATERS INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAMME ENABLING COUNCILS TO INVEST IN THEIR LOCAL COMMUNITIES. \$500 MILLION OF CROWN FUNDING HAS BEEN PRE-ALLOCATED TO COUNCILS BASED ON A NATIONALLY CONSISTENT FORMULA.

The funding was available from 1 July 2022. Government has appointed Crown Infrastructure Partners (CIP) to administer and monitor the fund for the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA). The programme will enable councils to focus on the wellbeing and aspirations of their communities. This Better Off funding can be used for those projects communities feel they need the most, be it local parks and gardens, swimming pools, libraries and community centres, or investment in public transport and infrastructure to protect against extreme weather events and sea level rises.

The Programme must support one or more of the Better Off Package criteria:

- Delivery of infrastructure and/or services that enable housing development and growth, with a focus on brownfield and infill development opportunities where those are available.
- Supporting communities to transition to a sustainable and low-emissions economy, including by building resilience
 to climate change and natural hazards.
- · Delivery of infrastructure and/or services that support local place-making and improvements in community well-being.

Funding proposals must be for new initiatives or projects; or accelerate, scale-up and or enhance the quality of planned investment.

The duration of the Programme of Expenditure must be 5 years or less with a completion date on or before 30 June 2027. The Total Maximum Amount Payable must be equal to or less than the Local Authority's Crown Funding allocation.



KŌPŪ MARINE PRECINCT, THAMES-COROMANDEL DC


CONSTRUCTION IS ON TRACK TO BE OPENED FOR USE IN MAY 2024. THE COMMERCIAL WHARF HAS BEEN CONSTRUCTED UP TO THE T HEAD.

All wharf piles, the concrete surface of the commercial slipway, and the wharf's concrete topping slab, wharf furniture and floating pontoons for the recreational boat ramp and wharf are now in place. The King Street formation has been constructed, including the finishing works to widen the Quay Street entrance, laying services, topping up the pavement areas and installing the lights, CCTV cameras, fences and gates.

Most of the \$15.3m cost of the project is being met through:

- \$8.2m grant from the government's 'Shovel Ready' Fund;
- \$4.05m from the Three Waters Reform 'Better Off' funding from the Department of Internal Affairs, and;
- \$1.4m from the Thames Community Board's Thames Urban General-Purpose Reserve.

A further \$565k has been granted from the Waikato Regional Council's Regional Fund. The Thames Community Board has currently underwritten the contingency shortfall, while external funding is sought for the remaining \$565k.

TISBURY STORAGE FACILITY (TE UNUA) – INVERCARGILL CITY

SOUTHLAND'S NEW MUSEUM COLLECTION STORAGE FACILITY, THE TE PĀTAKA TAOKA SOUTHERN REGIONAL COLLECTIONS FACILITY, AT TISBURY, IS A REGIONAL ASSET.

Invercargill City Council's construction of Southland's first dedicated museum collection storage facility, will enable the history of the region to continue to be protected and shared with the community and future generations.

The DIA Better Off Package funded \$3.9m towards the 1,650m2 facility including temperature-controlled storage

areas and specialist shelving to ensure taonga are stored appropriately, offices, and a conservation lab for museum collection items within the region.

The transfer of items from the Southland Museum and Art Gallery is expected to continue until April 2024. Items from other regional museum collections will also be housed within the Tisbury facility. Demolition of the existing Southland Museum and Art Gallery is scheduled to begin mid-24, once all items within the collection are transferred to the new storage facility at Tisbury.

ASHBURTON FREIGHT HUB

- The \$14m Fairfield Freight Hub project is a joint initiative with the Ashburton District Council, Fairfield Freight Hub, and KiwiRail. The Better Off Package fund is contributing \$2.3m which will be fully claimed in Nov-23.
- The project sees the rail hub relocate from the centre of town, enabling businesses moving goods and easing congestion on roads; local rail freight is expected to increase from 6,000 containers a year to 20,000.
- Increased local rail freight will take truck movements
 off SH1, and not having trains shunting in town will
 relieve congestion in Ashburton town intersections.
 The hub relocation will increase road safety on
 SH1 and through Ashburton township and reduce
 carbon emissions.

The new freight hub is near Council's north-east Ashburton Business Estate.
